Maths at Springfield – Key Stage 1

In Year 1, it is likely that your child will already be able to tell you what a + and a - sign mean.

In Year 1, they start to write out calculations formally using mathematical symbols, and should have an understanding of what each symbol represents. You will find lots of Year 1 maths worksheets and activities on our Year 1 maths hub, so you can select what you need for your child.

Many children thrive on learning through play, so ask them to roll a die twice and add those two numbers together, using the proper symbols. You can also make Bingo cards with addition calculations on and ask them to place the numbers that are the answers on top.

Have plenty of tangible objects for them to visualise the calculations with too – anything works, from buttons and toys to raisins or chocolate buttons!

E-Safety – Security your child's device

In an ever-changing world, ensuring pupils' safety online has never been more important. It is an all-encompassing duty and something every teacher and parent must be vigilant of. Being safe online means individuals are protecting themselves and others from online harms and risks, which may jeopardise their personal information, lead to unsafe communications or even effect their mental health and wellbeing. To begin our new Springfield E-Safety section, we would like to start off by sharing these fantastic 'how to' guides on how to ensure your child's devices are as secure and safe as possible. It is incredibly important that you, as a parent, have the knowledge and understanding of how to secure your child's device to prevent them from potential online dangers.

Perhaps take some time to sit down with your child to explain how parental restrictions keep them safe, whilst allowing for free and open communication on how they use their devices.

Pastoral – Keeping children safe at Springfield School

Following an upsurge in cases of sexual harassment and abuse reported on the "Everyone's Invited" website and TikTok schools are being encouraged to update their behaviour and anti-bullying policies with a new section focused on the management of allegations of peer-on-peer abuse. Whilst we would not wish to cause unnecessary worry or alarm, we feel it is important to inform our community of the steps being taken within school to keep all children safe, and the role members of the wider school can play to support this.

Creating a safe environment

Our primary aim is to create a safe learning environment for all pupils, in which it does not tolerate any form of bullying, discrimination or peer on peer abuse. Though our assemblies, staff training, PSHE lessons and other opportunities (such as this newsletter), we will adopt an educational, preventative and pro-active approach to safeguarding all children and the wider school community. Peer-on-peer abuse can take a number of forms including bullying, cyberbullying, physical abuse and sexting, so it is important that all members of our community can identify possible signs of such issues, are able to report any concerns, and feel that the school will respond to them appropriately.

Our staff receive robust training from both our internal safeguarding team and external providers to ensure they are highly trained and able to respond to any concerns raised by the school community. Our pupils will receive age-appropriate guidance and information through our assemblies and PSHE in a way that will empower and inform them to keep themselves and others safe, without causing fear or alarm. Members of the school community can report any concerns through:

Pupils	 Use of classroom Emotional Register to indicate to staff member that they are upset and require support. Conversations with class teacher or other trusted member of staff. Use of class worry box / worry monsters. Speaking to a Pupil Parliament, "Kindness Ninja" or Playground Buddy.
Parents	 In the first instance any concerns should be addressed to a child's class teacher via: Face to face conversation at drop off / collection times. Letter or email (<u>info@springfield.surrey.sch.uk</u>) addressed to class teacher. Telephone conversation
and Carers	If the child's class teacher is unavailable or in the event of a serious allegation parents can also contact a member of the Pastoral Team or Senior Leadership Team using the methods outlined above. Parents are encouraged to report any concerns to the school rather than seek to address incidents themselves. When reporting a concern regarding online bullying or inappropriate behaviour on social media, it may be helpful for school staff to be shown screen shots of messages or activity to assist the investigation process.

We would encourage any parents whose children have mobile phones to speak regularly to their children about the importance of keeping themselves safe when using their phones - particularly if they are active on social media platforms including TikTok, Houseparty and WhatsApp, as we are seeing increasing numbers of issues having to be investigated and managed in school as a result of children using these services unsupervised.

Seeking help and support

The school are always happy to support members of our community with any concerns, however if you require support during times when the school is closed - e.g. at weekend, you can find details of a number of agencies offering support on the Safeguarding and Wellbeing Support for Parents sections of our website.

In addition, the dedicated number **0800 136 663**, run by the NSPCC, will provide both children and adults who are victims of sexual abuse in schools with the appropriate support and advice. This includes how to contact the police and report crimes if they wish. The helpline will also provide support to parents and professionals too.

The Lucy Faithfull Foundation is a UK wide charity dedicated solely to preventing child sexual abuse.
