

Reading at Springfield

Research shows that the more children read at home, the better they perform in school. We recommend that at KS1 children should be reading for between 10 and 15 minutes a day and at KS2 children should be reading for at least 20 minutes a day. Reading and sharing books with adults promotes children's oracy and literacy skills and helps them foster a lifelong love of learning.

IT ADDS UP! If you read just 15 minutes a day, in one year you will have read over 1,000,000 words! Sure trendemen

Maths at Springfield - Key Stage 1

At home, younger children (KS1) could sort counters into sets of colour, shape or size or count out a particular number using the counters to help. They could practise addition by combining two different amounts and begin to realise that subtraction will 'undo' this. Younger children benefit from moving items as they count them as this avoids counting the same item twice.

Older children could practise division (which many children find difficult) by 'sharing' the sweets or pasta into equal groups or by seeing how many different sets can be made from the amount (for example, 12 could be made as three groups of four, four groups of three, two groups of six and so on).

Historical Figure Day

Springfield Primary School celebrated Historical Figure Day on Thursday and the children had a fantastic, fun-filled day! The past was brought back to life as Albert Einstein returned, William Shakespeare and a bevy of suffragettes! Furthermore, the day celebrated the significance of a historical figure and their impact on society today, while also exploring the life and times of that person. Each year group spent the day learning about an important figure in history and how they overcame circumstances to bring upon change. It was also lovely to see the children dressed up and engaged in their learning throughout the course of the day. We hope the day inspired the children to make their own difference to society and therefore make their own powerful impact!

After half-term we will be giving small group tours of 5 people for Reception 2022 intake.



E-Safety

WhatsApp - is your child using it in a safe way?

WhatsApp is a downloadable app that allows users to send messages, photos, videos and many other device compatible documents to any other user, once you have obtained their mobile number.

It allows other users to see when you have been online and are currently using the app. Children can use WhatsApp as a preferred way to communicate with friends and family, as it is deemed more private than other apps such as Snapchat or Facebook. The app also enables children to create groups of up to 250 people, posing the risk of strangers and those with questionable intentions to inadvertently be able to contact your children, if they are added to a 'friends' group.

As one of the less inconspicuous apps, parents often overlook the use of WhatsApp. However, messaging apps with the **potential for strangers** to be able to contact your child, should be checked and regulated daily to avoid inappropriate usage and damaging content being viewed by children. Talk with your child about the importance of only chatting with known, trusted people and to block messages from strangers.



Forest School

The Year 6 children have been having great fun and developing their skills over within their Forest School sessions. The children have been learning how to build, light and safely extinguish a small fire. They experimented with different structures and chose the one they thought would be most successful to roast their marshmallows on. All groups succeeded, and it was lovely to see them developing knowledge and skills to complete the challenge successfully.

Last Monday, the children used Bowsaws and Palm drills to make wood cookie whirligig toys, keychains and necklaces. Safety was paramount, with them having to work together well and communicate effectively to ensure the wood was cut safely and accurately. Well done the Year 6 classes for their determination and excellent behaviour.
