Full information is available on Surrey's website at www.surreycc.gov.uk/primaryadmissions. The Surrey Schools & Childcare Service can also provide impartial help in completing an application. Applications received after the closing date without an exceptional reason will be treated as late, and will not be considered until all on time applications have been processed. This may jeopardise the chance of a parent being offered one of their preferred schools for their child.

Thank-you to the **PTA for the excellent Christmas Bauble workshops**. The children thoroughly enjoyed the events. With the **virtual pantomime** next week, the PTA could not have worked harder in providing a wonderful array of festive events for pupils.

English at Springfield

Higher order thinking is the ability to think beyond memorising facts or knowledge. Higher order thinking skills involve applying the knowledge, finding connections between facts and understanding the material. Benjamin Bloom, an educational psychologist, developed a classification system that defined lower and higher order thinking.

This system is known as **<u>Bloom's taxonomy</u>**. The six levels within the cognitive domain are listed from lower to higher: **<u>knowledge, comprehension, application, analysis, evaluation and creating</u>**

By using higher levels of questioning, children will develop a higher order of thinking. Asking questions before reading can provide an insight of how your child will process the information. Pre-reading questions can assist learners with making connections and generating interest in the story or text. Here are examples of questions for each level:

Knowledge

Who are the main characters? What does the main character look like?

Comprehension

What is the book about? Which part do you like best? Why?

Application

Can you think of another story with a similar theme? Have you had any similar experiences?

<u>Analysis</u>

How has the author used description to show how the character is feeling? What evidence can you use to support your view?

Evaluation


Which story is better and why? Which parts of the text could be improved?

Creating

Using evidence in the text, what do you think about..? If you were the main character, how would you have reacted to this?

Family Support

Online Safety

Recently there have been occasions when The Pastoral Team have investigated safeguarding situations where there is evidence on a mobile phone, through this we are continuously reminded of the huge potential risk to children's wellbeing and safety. This is not a school-based problem, it is a global one. So we would like to ask you some questions:

- Does your child have a phone?
- Do you consider it your property or your child's?
- Does your child have social media accounts? If so, which ones and are you familiar with them?
- To your knowledge, has your child been bullied via a phone or on social media?
- Would your child give you their phone to look through if asked?
- Would you know how to search it?
- What would you do if you found unacceptable or concerning content on your child's phone?

While the law can be very complicated, if your child is under 18 and living with you, you have a good deal of authority because you also have a liability.

Ask to look at your child's phone and see what their reaction is. They need clear and firm boundaries that they cannot cross.

Social media websites have a huge influence over our children. This can be incredibly positive and supportive however, they can also be horribly destructive and dangerous.

TikTok appears to have a lot of negative influence at the moment. Nationally children are using the platform to target teachers in digitally altered pictures and videos, often shown in social media accounts, which claim to be 'official' school accounts. At best, these are harmless - funny or silly and best ignored. At worst, however, they can be obscene, malicious and defamatory with the same disastrous consequences that can happen when children are bullied.

Pastoral Support

Spelthorne Borough Council are committed to supporting the most vulnerable households and, over the winter, they are providing financial assistance via the government's Household Support Fund (HSF) grant scheme.

The Council will be providing funds via one-off payments ranging from £50 to £80, depending on the household's situation, as detailed below:

£50 per household for over 70s

£60 per household for 18-69-year-olds without children living in the home

£80 per household for families with children at home

Please note, there is a limit of one payment per household.

This new grant will run to 31 March 2022 and nationally totals £500m. Of this, £421m will be for councils in England. Spelthorne has been allocated approximately £300,000 by Surrey Council from the funding received by Surrey.
