
Maths at Springfield

Create a height chart

This is a classic but still a good idea, which can sometimes be forgotten!

Find a wall and some long paper (a roll of lining paper works well)

- 2. Mark on the height of your children, you, and the family pets (plants and animals included).
- 3. Do it again after... a day, month, 6 months, a year, 10 years.



Later, children might want to share their record of heights with a friend or family member. If you try this out together, you might notice during your conversation that a photo doesn't reveal enough information about the heights marked on the wall. Here, we need a standard measure, which others can also work with! We introduce standard measures (meters and centimetres) when we need to communicate our mathematics with someone.

Once you mark meters and centimetres on your chart, then you might also draw on or mark sports stars (Serena Williams 1.75m, Lionel Messi 1.70m) or even interesting animal sizes (adult ostrich 2.7m, pet rabbit 35cm).

How does it encourage mathematical talk? There is lots of mathematical language here. The conversation is one about size, and about height. Your conversation might use language such as, taller, shorter, difference, fast, slow, more, less, the same.

How can you extend thinking? When comparing height against markers you will also be thinking about time, the seasons and months. It's interesting to ask: Who is growing the fastest? Is this the same rate all year round? What other questions could you explore together?

Pastoral

We are aware that many of our children are worried and anxious about the events unfolding in Europe at the moment. As such, we would like to share some thoughts about how to talk to your children about frightening events and managing those worries.

Find out what they know and address and misconceptions

When children hear things in the playground or catch snippets of conversations there is a good chance that there will be disparity between their thoughts and the reality. Allow them to share with you what they know and ask questions. Try to clarify knowledge and ask questions honestly but simply and without causing worry or distress. Always be mindful of the age of your child and remember to share in an age-appropriate way.

Allow your child to express their feelings

Encourage your child to talk about how they are feeling and the different emotions they are experiencing. They may find it easier to draw a picture, or use toys, teddies or puppets to talk about it.

Shield them from images on the TV

Where possible try to minimise their exposure to images which can be frightening and cause worries.

Routine

Try to ensure you keep to your child's regular routine including bedtimes and mealtimes. Routines help children to feel safe and secure.
