
Maths at Springfield

Supporting your child with 3D shapes.

In school, your child will learn about the following key geometric shapes: spheres, cones, prisms and pyramids. It is worth knowing that geometrically prisms incorporate more solid shapes than you might traditionally think of as prisms. For example, did you know that both a cube and a cuboid with a square base and straight sides are actually considered prisms?

What are the properties of 3D shapes?

The properties of 3D shapes are their faces, edges and vertices, which all have specific meanings in the context of primary school maths lessons.



What is a face?

A face is a flat surface to a 3D object. For example, a square based prism has 5 faces. A sphere has 1 curved surface but no face.

What is an edge?

An edge is where two line segments or faces meet. A cylinder has 2 edges.

What are vertices?

Vertices are where two lines or edges meet; in maths we refer to the corners of 3D shapes as vertices. The singular of vertices is actually vertex which can be a bit confusing. A cone has one vertex, and a cube has 8 vertices.

Sport

We have had a busy week with sport with the boys' football tournament, cross country and a girls' football match.

The boys' football tournament at Egham Leisure Centre was a great opportunity to see potential recruits for our boys' football team, with the tournament being open to pupils in Year 4 & 5. We played against teams who consisted of Year 6 pupils, so our boys knew playing football would be our only way to be successful. It was tough at times, but the boys did a great job considering the age difference in most teams with an overall 5th place finish. *Well-done Noah, Albie, Ethan, Charlie, Sidney and Issac.*

The following day was one of the major events of the year the cross country competition. This event consisted of over 90 children in each race. Our school did fantastic with so many Top 20 finishes. In each race anyone that finished in the Top 8 received a medal so an even bigger achievement! Both Eadie (6th) and Alex (4th) finished in the top 8 in the Year 3/4 girls and 3/4 boys events. What is more we went one better in the Year 5/6 events with Ava coming in 1st place by more than 200m in the girls event and William (1st) and Santino (2nd) in the boys event, with both finishing over 100m ahead of 3rd place. I am extremely proud of this achievement as all the children have been working tirelessly this past week training at lunchtimes, as well as every Friday taking part in the Kids' Marathon event. Well-done Leighton, Alfie, IreOlewa, Poppy, Alex, Baye, Maya, Eadie, Jamie, Ava, Rita, Sienna, Santino, William, Albie, Bonnie, Preston, Molly, JP and Miley.

Finally, on Monday the girls' football team hosted Hawkdale in a local derby. It didn't disappoint in terms of action from both sides, with Springfield coming out on top with a 3-2 victory with hat-trick hero, and player of the match, Isla, scoring a second successive hat-trick to ensure all 3 points went to Springfield. Well-done Baneet, Bethany, Molly, Ava, Megan, Lola, Maizy, Isla.



Reading

At Springfield we are continuously promoting the importance of early reading and encouraging a love of reading. Children have regular access to our amazing LRC facility whilst in school however we know that over the summer children may have limited access to new books. Surrey Libraries are launching an exciting summer challenge in partnership with The Science Museum group, starting from 9th July until 17 September. This year's Challenge will be a celebration of reading, science, and innovation. Children can join the free Summer Reading Challenge at their local Library, help six fun characters and become a party-planning science visionary!

Designed for all reading abilities. Every participant receives stickers and other incentives along the way – there is a reward for every book they read. Those children who read six books are presented with a personalised certificate and an amazing medal! Pastoral

With so much in the news lately about the cost-of-living crisis, inflation and rising fuel and food costs we are aware that many of their children are becoming more aware of their family's financial situation and that, in some cases, this is starting to cause anxiety. The current economic situation will inevitably have an impact on all of our lives, and so it is important that we are mindful of how this may unsettle the children. Whilst it is wise to ensure that children do not become burdened or excessively worried about finances, it is important that talking about money does not become a taboo and that they feel they can ask questions and have them answered honestly.

- If you need to cut back on spending explain this to your children and reassure them.
- Children often pick up on anxieties so seek support from trusted friends or family members if you are feeling overwhelmed.
- Children often notice the difference between what their parents can afford compared to their peers, so it is important to model gratitude and being thankful for what we have.
- Acknowledge any worries your child may have and allow them to talk about them.

Support from school

Our Pastoral Team are always available to speak to you if your financial situation is starting to have a significant impact on your family. They are able to make referrals to food banks and other agencies, in addition to providing practical support.

Every Tuesday, the local charity Surplus 2 Supper makes a delivery to school of food items which can be accessed by the whole school community. These are placed in crates and boxes outside the main entrance from 2.30pm on a Tuesday. In addition, they run a Surplus shop every Saturday and Sunday morning at Sunbury Cricket Club where you can collect a selection of food items including bread, meat, fruit and vegetables for a mindful donation.

Budget friendly ideas for half term

Pastoral Coffee Morning - 'Supporting Emotions'






