Maths at Springfield

Supporting your child's understanding of area.

What is area?

Area is the measurement of a surface or space of a 2-D, flat shape. (This is not to be confused with volume, which is a measurement of space in any 3-D shapes.)

How Do You Find The Area of a shape?

Area can be found with two different methods. Area maths is very dependent on year group.

For lower KS2 (Year 4) the area of a basic 2-D shape can be found by using squares. If a rectangle is 4 cm by 3 cm, there will be 12 equal squares. By counting the squares, the area can be found. For this, it would be 12 cm2. For the upper KS2, Years 5 and 6, this can be found using formulae. These are listed below:

Square: length x length

Triangle: (base x height) ÷ 2

h

Rectangle: length x width

width

Parallelogram: base x height

On Wednesday, Year 6 held a Family Learning afternoon, that focused on the pupils' current Science topic – ID. As we have been researching fingerprints, we organised pupils into groups to discover and extract hidden fingerprints on various items. They became Forensic Scientists by lifting latent prints, using dusting techniques and considerable patience! Pupils referred to picture cards showing the different fingerprint categories to classify each of their prints to find out which print types were the most common in the year group. Pastoral

At Springfield we are committed to creating an inclusive community, where everyone feels welcome and included. Whilst some of our families may worry or feel uncomfortable about discussing issues of race and equality with their children, for others their experiences mean they are forced to confront this. Children are taught about racism and equality in line with the national curriculum and in addition "celebrating difference" will be included as one of the themes of our well being afternoons next year.

As parents you are your child's most powerful role model when forming opinions and perceptions of the world, and so wanted to share some guidance and advice for those who may feel unsure or worried about dealing with these issues.

- Give your child opportunities to ask questions. Listen carefully and provide honest answers. Praise them for asking questions.
- Ensure you use age-appropriate language when talking to your child.
- Use the concept of "fairness" as a way to explain equality children find this easier to understand especially with examples.
- Ask your child for their views.
- Children tend to follow the example of the adults around them. By using appropriate language and watching and reading content that is diverse sends a positive message to your child.
- Encourage your child to watch programmes and read books that show a wide range of cultures, views and beliefs.
- Be honest about what you don't know. It may be appropriate for you and your child to do some research together or to discuss questions they may have.
- Ensure their exposure to the media is limited and age appropriate it is important for them to understand what is happening, but not to the extent that it causes distress and anxiety.

Simple activities to help explain equality to children can be carried out using a tube of Smarties, M&M's or other similar sweet.

- Tip out the packet and divide them between family members, giving more to some and less to others without explaining why. How do they feel about this? Is this fair? If not, what would make it fair?
- Redistribute the sweets deliberately giving more to one "group" of participants e.g male, female, adults. How
 do they feel about this? Is this fair that they get more just because of their age or gender? If not, what would
 make it fair?
- Ask the children to sort the sweets into their different coloured groups. Then bite one sweet of each colour in half. What do they notice? How might this also be the same for people?

Unicef and Save The Children have some excellent advice on their website around these issues, and we are aware that there are a number of other websites and social media platforms offering support to parents about these important conversations.




