To honour the life and legacy of the Queen the school will be closed for a national day of mourning on 19th September. KS1 children took part in **Roald Dahl Day on Tuesday as part of a "wow" curriculum start**, inspiring their early love of reading. English at Springfield

Below are some useful questions you can ask your child when reading with them at home:

Reviewing:

Can you tell me what your book is about?

Where is your story set, how do you know?

What characters have you been introduced to so far?

What are the characters like?

Do the different characters all get on?

When they are reading:

What does that word mean? How do you know it means that?

How can you use the rest of the sentence/the next sentence to help you work out the meaning of that word?

What words on this page impress or confuse you?

Can you summarise what you have read so far?

If you were to meet the main character, what would you ask them?

Predicting:

What do you think will happen to the main character?

Why do you think this will happen?

Are there any clues to tell you what will happen next?

Do you think the story will stay in this setting?

Can you find any evidence in the story that shows...?

Maths at Springfield

Subtraction

Subtraction is a process which most children learn quite naturally as soon as they learn to start counting. During the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS), it is really important for children to have the chance to work practically with their maths.

An example might be that a child has 10 sweets. They give 3 to their teddy. How many do they have left? What if they gave another to their teddy? What if their teddy had 8 sweets, how many would be left for them?

Later on, when children are confident subtracting practically, they can progress on to number lines or counting back in their heads. When children have understood this, they can begin to learn their subtraction facts and progress on to column subtraction. In Years 4 and 5, they start subtracting decimals.

Knowing your subtraction facts is still a key skill that children need to be able to use in real life maths - you may not always have a pencil and paper to hand to do your column subtraction, but you will always have your subtraction facts!



Pastoral

Celebrating and remembering Queen Elizabeth.

We have been so sorry to hear about the death of our Queen. For the majority of our school community, she is the only Monarch we have known, and her passing may feel like a significant change. Whether you support the Royal Family or have conflicting feelings around them, a significant passing such as this is likely to be in the news for some time and we are aware that it may cause children to feel worried, ask questions or revisit memories of their bereavements they themselves have experienced.

If your children are asking questions or feeling worried, encourage them to look at the legacy she has left. Focus on how hard she worked, the difference she made, the people she helped, the happy memories she has given people. Watch the Paddington video from the recent Jubilee celebrations, or the James Bond clip from the 2012 Olympics. Talk about how, even though she was a Queen, she clearly had a fun side and enjoyed life. Allow your children to share any memories they may have of her or watch footage of celebrations – such as the Royal Weddings, Jubilee Celebrations – and use them as discussion points.

Allow your children to talk openly and honestly about any feelings they may have and answer any questions factually and truthfully. Validate their feelings, reassure that they are normal and will pass. Do use clear language e.g. die, dead and not phrases such as "gone to sleep" as this can cause confusion, be even more scary and possibly lead to worries and fears at bedtime
